In which is Exhibited a Perfect VIEW of the English Fleet, as they Anchored all along the Coast, in the Bay, near the Town; and also after they moved and laid under the Forts of St Jago, and St Philipe, and at the Boca chica, or Mouth of the Harbour: Likewise of the English Ships as they moved in different parts in the Harbour, in order to lay Siege to the Town.

This Plan I do affirm to be the only true Copy of the Draught brought over by me to show the different Movements of his Majestys Fleet, laid before the Regency, & the Lords of the Admiralty -

- R. The Fort of St. Jago & St. Philipe to guns mounted on them, attack'd the 9<sup>th</sup> of March.
- S. English Bomb Battery between the two Forts.
- T. Large Bomb Forts from Sandoval to Sotomayor.
- U. St. Jago's Gun Battery mounted with 60 guns, mounted by Capt<sup>r</sup> W. Lloyd.
- V. The fort of St. Jago taken by the English, in which were 1000 men, who were brought to England.
- XX. The fort of Spanish Men of War, built in another Sec<sup>r</sup> on Sicily, demolished.
- Y. The Paseo Fort mounted with 16 guns.
- Z. The Boca Chica Fort, the mouth of the Harbour held by the English.
- 1. The enemy's 12 Gun French Battery, neighbouring the Boca Chica Fort.
- 2. The enemy's 12 Gun French Battery, under which was a hole.
- 3. A large Number of boats full of the Spanish going through the Boca Chica Fort, to be landed.
- 4. The Boca Chica Fort, the English taking it.
- 5. The Boca Chica Fort, the English taking it.
- 6. The Spanish Sloops sent out Harbours for the ships in case they should be driven away from the Mouth of the Harbour & also for the Ships.

- 14. The Manzanales Fort mounted with 18 guns, but made no defence.
- 15. The Spanish Men of War, six Galleons sunk on each side of the Paseo to the Morrows.
- 16. The English Men of War at anchor, to lay Siege to the Town. The Oxford, Lt. Turville, Sir, the Bufford Capt<sup>r</sup> Griffith, Capt<sup>r</sup> Lawrence, Captain.
- 17. A French Merchant Ship, Baring, of 1000 T.
- 18. Fort Ligero.
- 19. The Spanish Ships, driving away from the Town.
- 20. A Spanish Ship, another going before the narrow Channel in the Harbour.
- 21. The Agam and the Bufford lying near the narrow Channel.
- 22. The Agam lost his main top being drove into the fort, he had the foremast above, so as to run on the Fort, but he on the Sotomayor, and was lost for ever, a late, the Spanish Sloops went after her & brought them back to their Respective Ships.
- 23. Considerate Layout with the Transports.
